\$5M CAMPAIGN



We are working with schools, directors, advisors and students to launch new clubs, crucial Jewish programming, lead urgent pro-Israel events and strengthen Jewish connections. We are also **increasing security measures and mental health support** for our JSU students and staff.

FRIEDBERG FOUNDATION IMPACT STUDY: RESULTS

NOVEMBER 2022

Following the release of the Friedberg Foundation Impact Study, which looked at respondents' participation in and attitudes toward Jewish life, the results are in. The survey measured a multitude of indicators measuring Jewish affiliation, attitudes, and practice, including attitudes towards intermarriage, Shabbat practice, and frequency of learning Jewish texts and ideas.

Out of the 25% college teens who said that they made a religious change resulting from their participation in NCSY, they now identify as traditional (16.7%) and orthodox (45.8%) totalling 67.5%.

HERE ARE SOME ADDITIONAL HIGHLIGHTS:

- **73.5%** of teens agree, strongly agree or very strongly agree indicate that they have decided to marry a Jew as a result of their participation in NCSY.
- **78.6%** of respondents agree, strongly agree, or very strongly agree that it is important to make Shabbat special as a result of their participation in NCSY.
- **37.8%** of respondents indicate that they have stopped using electricity always, frequently, or occasionally on Shabbat as a result of their participation with NCSY.
- **60.1%** of respondents indicate that they are regularly learning Jewish texts or ideas always, frequently or occasionally as a result of their participation with NCSY.
- **42.8%** of respondents indicate that they keep kosher always, frequently, or occasionally as a result of their participation in NCSY.
- **72.5%** agree or strongly agree that as a result of their participation in NCSY that they want to take on leadership roles in the Jewish community.
- **79.4%** of respondents agree, strongly agree, or very strongly agree that their connection to Israel has strengthened as a result of their participation in NCSY.
- **64.2%** of all respondents very strongly agree that they engage in Israel advocacy in their high school or college as a result of their participation in NCSY.
- **68.4%** of respondents say that they hang out in Jewish social circles always, frequently, or occasionally as a result of their participation with NCSY.

AMENDMENT

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR SHABBATONS AND SUMMER IN ISRAEL

- A typical Shabbaton scholarship is on average \$100-\$200 per JSU student per Shabbaton. (we offer 3 Shabbatons a year)
- A typical Summer Scholarship is \$1,000-\$2,000 per JSU students (we offer 20, month long summer educational programs in Israel)

Staff

- Salary for a full time staff member per club is \$15,000. Each staff member runs up to 3 JSU clubs.

PROGRAMMING, SPEAKERS, FOOD, ADMIN, ETC

- On average a JSU brings in 3 professional guest speakers to a club on an annual basis. The average speaker we bring charges 1k per speech for a total of \$3,000 for speaker's fees per club over the course of the year.
- On average a JSU club provides 4 boxes of free kosher pizza per club. The average cost for that equals \$75 per club per day * 30 clubs over the course of the year comes to a total average cost of approximately \$2,250.
- On average a JSU club spends \$250 a week on supplies. An example of supplies for a club would be Menorahs for Chanukah, Siddurim/prayer books for every individual, a subscription to an online trivia service such as Kahoot, Bristol boards, food items and more. This comes out to an average of approximately \$7,500 per club for the year.
- On average a JSU Club does 2 school wide special Jewish holiday-based programs for the entire school to attend. The JSU club hosts the holiday party and invites the teachers and students to learn about the relevant Jewish holiday. The cost of each program is approximately \$1,200 (for a total of \$2,200) and includes extra food, supplies and educational materials needed to accommodate the large amount of individuals from the school that attend these special events.

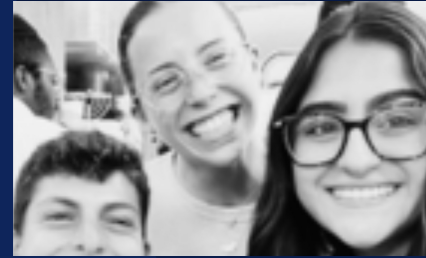
